



Nautical Puzzler


What is a “Trade Wind”? Which way does it blow and what causes it?

Answer

The distance around the earth is 24,875 miles. Since the earth rotates once in 24 hours somebody standing on the equator is moving about 1000 miles per hour. Of course somebody at the North pole is not moving at all (just rotating) and if one is a foot from the pole it takes all day to go just 6 feet. Clearly, the surface speed decreases as one moves North or South from the equator.

Consider now a blob of air at the equator being heated up by the sun. Hot air rises from the surface and so cooler air is drawn in from the side. This cooler air is going slower, however, and falls behind objects on the surface. Since the surface of the earth moves toward the East, the air drawn in toward the equator (due to rising air) moves relatively toward the West. Similarly, as blobs of air rise to higher altitudes they spread out to the North and South. After a while they also cool off and descend. But, since they started at the equator, they are moving faster. As they come down they create a Westerly wind. These are known as the Prevailing Westerlies.

Early navigators discovered that when they wanted to sail from Europe to the Americas the wind was blowing smack in their face. (Those old square riggers could not point very high into the wind). By first sailing South they found they could pick up an Easterly wind off the coast of Africa. On this map, (thanks Wikipedia), the blue lines are the prevailing Westerlies and the Yellow and Brown are the North and South Trade Winds.

W.A.V.E. 2013



It all began in 2011 when 6 local Pensacola Yacht Clubs came together to honor the Centennial of Naval Aviation with a celebration intended to be held at the Naval Air Station Pensacola. Initially, the NAS Command had envisioned a large celebration to be held on the Naval Base. However, after much planning, it became very obvious that such a massive celebration was not going to take place for several reasons, the least of which was the money to host the celebration. Following up with a request from the Command for a host, Navy Yacht Club Pensacola and Pensacola Yacht Club formed the nucleus of a planning

group to create the Centennial of Naval Aviation (CoNA) Celebration. Soon, this group was joined by Pensacola Beach Yacht Club, Grand Lagoon Yacht Club, Fort Walton Yacht Club, and the Point Yacht Club from Josephine, Alabama. Several Military affiliated organizations also joined in the event to ensure its success. The CoNA Celebration was

held at Pensacola Yacht Club (PYC), and was extremely successful with over 2500 visitors taking advantage of the event.

Following the completion of the CoNA Celebration, Navy Yacht Club Pensacola (NYCP) Commodore Kathy Champagne, along with several other yacht club members, thought it



would be a great idea to find a way to honor our veterans who were returning from Iraq and Afghanistan. It was suggested that such an event needed to focus on a specific group of veterans so the idea of honoring "wounded warriors" was selected. Following an attempt to solicit assistance from the Wounded Warriors Organization proved to be virtually impossible, Commodore Champagne formed a small group of NYCP members to plan and develop an appropriate event to honor veterans with a "Day on the Bay." It was soon decided that the honor should go to wounded veterans. The name of the event became the Wounded American Veterans Event or W.A.V.E. (W.A.V.E. 2012) as it is commonly now known.

The first event held at Fort Walton Yacht Club was hosted by the Fort Walton Yacht Club Chapter of the Florida Commodores Association and supported by the PYC Chapter of FCA and the NYCP Chapter of FCA in addition to that provided by Pensacola Beach Yacht Club, Grand Lagoon Yacht Club, and the Point Yacht Club. Even though the weather was not favorable for the event, it nevertheless was a success and the decision was made to continue the event annually.

Planning proceeded under the watchful eyes of now NYCP Past Commodore Kathy Champagne (a recent FCA 4 Star Commodore Awardee) and a select group of people from the sponsoring yacht clubs including the Immediate Past Commodore of the Florida Commodores Association and NYCP Fleet Captain, John Matthews; Fort Walton Yacht Club Fleet Captain John Farris; and PYC Fleet Captain Bob Sutton. The result was that W.A.V.E. 2013 became a reality with an opportunity for the public to show their appreciation to the armed forces and for soldiers to temporarily forget the



hardships they've suffered. The City of Pensacola was selected as the site for the event and the place was Plaza de Luna Park, overlooking Pensacola Bay to the south and having immediate access to a marina and slips to be used for boarding the boats used to take the veterans on a cruise on the bay. Marina Management Corporation, the owner of Palafox Pier Marina, provided slips at no cost to support W.A.V.E. 2013. Over 34 sponsors contributed financial or in-kind support to the event. The Mayor of Pensacola, Ashton Hayward, inked a Proclamation in support of the event. City Councilman P. C. Wu is shown giving the Proclamation to PYC Commodore Susan McKinnon at the beginning of the celebration. The Escambia County Board of Commissioners also commemorated the event with a Proclamation.



Fifty-nine veterans registered. Twenty-nine veterans spent the day cruising on Pensacola Bay, enjoying the sparkling water and the balmy summer breeze. And even with the sun beating down like a hammer, U.S. Air Force veteran of 10 years service, Capt. Giselle Hartl remarked that it still was far better than being in a desert overseas. "It's nice to be in the water," she observed. "In



Iraq or Afghanistan, you may not see water for months and months. It's difficult to know how to thank all the military veterans who have risked life and limb in service of our country, but a free day of sailing, BBQ, live music and prize raffles isn't a bad place to start."



Saturday morning during W.A.V.E. at Palafox Pier, six yacht clubs and 14 local boat captains offered just that. The boaters spent about two hours on the water and then returned to shore for hot dogs, hamburgers and homemade chocolate chip cookies.

Jim Henkel, an Army veteran who was wounded in the Vietnam War, attended the event with his 26-year-old son, James, a civilian who uses a wheelchair. Henkel said both of them enjoy sailing, but that their injuries and time constraints make it very difficult for them to go boating. "That's what made it so wonderful today," he said. "Having been off the water for a few years, it was nice to get back out there."



The veterans also heard a presentation from 32-year-old Brad Kendell, a US Paralympic sailor and member of the US Sonar Sailing Team, who stressed the importance of living to the fullest no matter what life throws at you. Kendell lost both of his legs, his father, and a friend in a private plane crash 10 years ago. "They invited me to let everyone know that you can get back out there," he said in his speech. "Getting back to life is what this is all about." Army Veteran Jim Henkel and his son really took this advice to heart and

are planning to continue their sailing experiences. Pictured to the left is PYC Commodore Susan McKinnon, Brad Kendell, and NYCP P/C Kathy Champagne presenting the W.A.V.E. 2013 Burgee to Brad, thanking him for his support.



In the picture on the right is Navy Captain (Retired and Veteran) Whit Johnson, a member of NYCP and the FCA Chapter, serving drinks to the veterans. Over 40 members each from Pensacola Yacht Club and Navy Yacht Club Pensacola volunteered to serve during this year's event. "We would like to see the W.A.V.E. continue to roll throughout the state of Florida with each chapter of FCA sponsoring a similar event," said Kathy Champagne.

5th Anniversary

In December, 2008, at the Cabot Lodge in Gainesville, a new organization was conceived by representatives from a handful of Florida yacht clubs who had a vision and developed a mission statement. In short order, Articles of Incorporation, By-

70th Anniversary

It was 1943 and the United States was engaged in WWII. The Army (yes - the Army) needed tugboats (yes - tugboats.) More than 700 tugboats were built by a dozen companies around the country. The Beresford Boat Works in DeLand, Florida, employed 300 people building

tugs for the Army some of which saw service during the D-Day invasion. A few of those tugs are still in service and one local historian is trying to return one to its birthplace. One of our programs will bring this piece of the Florida maritime history to life.



500th Anniversary

Archaeological research indicates that Florida has been inhabited for at least 14,000 years. Current historical records document native Indians living here since the 16th century. However, it was on April 2, 1513 that Juan Ponce de Leon, leading an expedition of three ships and 200 men, landed on what they thought was an island. Because of the lush landscape, they named their new discovery *La Florida*. The purpose of his voyage was to find the "Fountain of Youth." (Instead he found the birthplace of FCA!) A lot has happened over the past

500 years and we will hear a program that will relate some of the more interesting aspects of our history with a special slant on the marine history of Florida.

Tour The Casements and Lunch

Located on the eastern bank of the Halifax River, The Casements was built in the early 1900's as a retirement home for a clergyman and his wife. John D. Rockefeller purchased it in 1918 and lived in the house during the winters until his death there at the age of ninety-seven. While a resident of Ormond Beach, "Neighbor John," as he preferred to be called, enjoyed taking part in community activities: playing golf, participating in the sing-along at the Ormond Hotel each Sunday, and entertaining friends such as Thomas Edison, Henry Ford and Harvey Firestone. A big event each year was the Christmas party he hosted for friends, a tradition carried on to this day by The Casements Guild.

The Casements, named for the large hand-cut casement windows that adorn the mansion, has been beautifully restored. Set on the shore of the Halifax River, and just two blocks from the Atlantic Ocean, the late John D. Rockefeller's winter home is known as "The Jewel of Ormond Beach."

The Casements' property was originally nine acres that stretched east from the Halifax River to the present day Halifax Drive, with a private trail and right-of-way to the Atlantic Ocean. Rockefeller employed a Swedish landscape designer to develop the gardens to his own specifications. Extensive renovations were done in 2009 to recreate the Rockefeller Gardens. A promenade along the river entices people to stroll.

There is no charge for admission to the mansion but donations are requested. The tour will depart from the Bahama House at 10:00 a.m. Lunch will be at Las Bistro, a 1924 historic Sears & Roebuck home. Depending on the weather we can enjoy the shade of the Magnolia trees in the garden patio or dine in one of the cozy dining rooms.
