# The Consequences of Leadership

In December 2008, a small group of Past Commodores from several Florida yacht clubs, including Treasure Island, Fort Walton, Pensacola, Navy Pensacola, Bay Point, North Palm Beach, Charlotte Harbor, Palm Coast, Old Port and Matanzas River met at a hotel in Perry, Florida to lay out the final plans for the creation of the Florida Commodores Association. This small group formed the basis of the founding fathers of the FCA.

By the end of January 2009, the FCA had 73 paid Past Commodore members and had officially chartered Charlotte Harbor Yacht Club Chapter, Pensacola Yacht Club Chapter, Fort Walton Yacht Club Chapter, Old Port Yacht Club Chapter, and Platinum Point Yacht Club Chapter, with several other chapters in the application process.

What had begun as a small group of Past Commodores had expanded very rapidly into the Florida Commodores Association under the leadership of visionaries like Philip Bouckaert, Rosemary Bouckaert, Richard Kelley, Art Garside, Chari Leitch, Rich Oakley, Tom Reynolds, Jack Kennedy, John Matthews, Ron Richards, Larry Kimmerling, John Slattery, Lou Daniello and Joe Tringali. These visionaries were willing to contribute their time, talent and treasure to ensure the FCA would grow and develop into an organization that focused on developing future Florida yacht club leaders using the knowledge and experiences of seasoned yacht club Past Commodores to assist them. The FCA was born from a consequence of vision and great leadership.

For almost 11 years since our beginning, the Association had been the beneficiary of a pool of talented and committed Past Commodores who were willing to serve in leadership positions in the Association. They have come from all parts of the State of Florida and have served the Association well. Our organization has grown from the consequence of strong leadership.

Our membership is strong, over 300 members. However, over the past two years there has been a reluctance on the part of our members to "get involved" with serving the Association in an elected position on the Executive Committee in order to ensure the continued successful operation and administration of the Association. No organization can survive the consequences from the lack of leadership.

This year, the Association has had to rely on several former Association officers who were willing to serve in capacities that they had served in before because there was no one who was willing to commit themselves to serve in leadership positions. They did this because they strongly believe in the mission of FCA. As motivated as they are, no one can do this forever. For this reason we are in great need of new "blood" in the leadership chain. There are many potential great leaders among the member-

ship. I know you don't want us to be an asterisk in yacht club history but, this could be the consequence of an unwillingness to serve.

I can go on and on about what the purpose of the FCA is and what good we have accomplished but these things do not make the Association a viable and useful organization focused on continuing their role as "Keepers of the Flame". It takes dedicated leadership to ensure the Association continues as a viable and relevant group. The yachting community needs the FCA and we need to keep ourselves, as an Association, focused and dedicated on making sure the "yachting community" continues to survive.

I want to re-emphasize that the FCA needs serious, experienced and committed former yacht club leaders to accept the challenge offered by agreeing to serve as an elected officer and leader of the Florida Commodores Association in the future. We need you!

The intent is to express our appreciation to a group of wounded veterans for their service and sacrifice by providing them with a day on Charlotte Harbor and the Peace River either fishing, sailing, or just a relaxing sightseeing cruise. We also provide them with a continental breakfast, lunch, a short ceremony, and a goody bag of items donated by local merchants.



The event involved about 21 veterans and their guest, Boat Captains, and volunteers from the PGBC, for a total involvement of about 65 people.

There were a lot of moving parts involved in the event, all necessary and important, such as the boat captains, whom we couldn't have done without, the "dock watchers" who helped the vets on and off the boats and provided security for the boats while the captains were at the continental breakfast or lunch, the transportation to and from the marina, the sponsors and volunteers who donated either food, money, or items for the goody bags, the volunteers who solicited for donations and helped serve the vets the food, and those involved in the flag-folding ceremony.

We had seven boats from the Boat Club, one professional Guide from Fishing Franks, Captain Cayle Willis, and two boats from the Isles Yacht Club.

## Juan Sebastian De Elcano

The Juan Sebastian de Elcano, named after the Spanish explorer and captain of Magellan's last exploratory fleet which set sail in 1519, is a 113-meter four-masted topsail vessel, which has travelled more than 2 million nautical miles since its construction in 1927. The 92-year-old ship serves as a training vessel for future officers of the Spanish Navy. The 70 Midshipmen from the 421st Naval Cadre and the 151st Marines Cadre learn celestial navigation, meteorology, amphibious operations, and naval security during the six-month training voyage.



The ship's visit to Pensacola the first week of April is part of the vessel's world cruise celebrating the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Juan de Elcano and Ferdinand Magellan's historic circumnavigation of the earth. This was the ninth time the Elcano has visited Pensacola, the last time was in 2015. The Spanish Royal Navy training ship docked at Naval Air Station (NAS) Pensacola's Allegheny Pier.

The NAS Pensacola Commanding Officer Capt. Timothy Kinsella, Jr. said "We are excited and honored to have this historic vessel visit Pensacola and pull pierside to Naval Air Station Pensacola. This air station has deep ties to the Spanish military, including the construction of Ft. San Carlos de Austria in 1698 and Ft. San Carlos de Barrancas in 1797. This magnificent ship is a reminder of our shared maritime and military heritage and it is our privilege to welcome them here as a partner nation in present and future endeavors."

Juan Sebastian de Elcano Commanding Officer Capt. Ignacio Paz Garcia said Pensacola has been a favorite port visit for the training ship, evidenced by the vessel's eight previous visits to the city. "The

previous reports from port visits highlighted how the crew members and midshipmen enjoyed this port," he said. "This was because of the amazing and outstanding welcome and support from the people of Pensacola. We are delighted to have the opportunity to enjoy this city."

The Pensacola Yacht Club also has extensive history with the Elcano. The crew is always welcomed to PYC and also invited to a friendly competition in the form of a regatta. This time was no different. A challenge was sent out to Elcano's crew and it was accepted by the Spanish Navy Attache, Captain Juan Garcia-Fernandez. The vessels used were some new RS Ventures provided by the Satori Foundation and they worked well for the event. April 2, 2019 turned out to be great day with sunny skies, a Blue Angel performance, and a "fly-by" by American Magic. The American Magic flying over the water in Pensacola Bay is the "mule", New York Yacht Club's test boat for the for the 36th America's Cup. The test boat is about half the size of 75 ft. foiling monohull that will race in the Cup. Boy is it fast!

#### A Short History of Juan Sebastian De Elcano

Juan Sebastián de Elcano (1487–August 4, 1526) was a Spanish (Basque) sailor, navigator, and explorer best remembered for leading the second half of the first round-the-world navigation, having taken over after the death of Ferdinand Magellan.

In the Philippines, Magellan befriended the King of Zzubu, who was eventually baptized with the name of "Don Carlos." Unfortunately, "Don Carlos" convinced Magellan to attack a rival chieftain for him, and Magellan was one of several Europeans killed in the ensuing battle. Magellan was succeeded by Duarte Barbosa and Juan Serrao, but both were treacherously killed by "Don Carlos" within a few days. Elcano was now second in command of the Victoria, under Juan Carvalho. Low on men, they decided to scuttle the Concepción and head back to Spain in the two remaining ships: the Trinidad and the Victoria.

Heading across the Indian Ocean, the two ships made a stop in Borneo before finding themselves at the Spice Islands, their original goal. Packed with valuable spices, the ships set out again. About this time, Elcano replaced Carvalho as captain of the Victoria. The Trinidad soon had to return to the Spice Islands, however, as it was leaking badly and eventually sank. Many of the Trinidad's sailors were captured by the Portuguese, although a handful managed to find their way to India and from there back to Spain. The Victoria sailed on cautiously, as they had gotten word that a Portuguese fleet was looking for them.

Miraculously evading the Portuguese, Elcano sailed the Victoria back into Spain on September 6, 1522. By then, the ship was crewed by only 22 men: 18 European survivors of the voyage and four Asians they had picked up en route. The rest had died, deserted or, in some cases, been left behind as unworthy of sharing in the spoils of the rich cargo of spices. The King of Spain received Elcano and granted him a coat of arms bearing a globe and the Latin

phrase Primus circumdedisti me, or "You Went Around Me First."

In Spain Juan Sebastian de Elcano is more revered than Magellan. Elcano finished the voyage.

Many youth sailing programs have transitioned from a time when they were completely supported by a 501c7 private not-for-profit yacht club, where the club bylaws defined the group/activity as a "membership class." Activities, including fund raising, were managed by a yacht club board member. For very sound business reasons for both the youth activity and yacht club, most of these youth programs separated from their yacht club parent to become an independent 501c3 not-for-profit charitable/ school organization able to accept and document tax deductible donations. Most youth sailing organizations now function as an arm's length, registered 501c3 organization. The yacht clubs and youth sailing schools are separate but have a symbiotic relationship that benefits both organizations.

Charlotte Harbor Yacht Club (CHYC) made this transition in 2010 when Charlotte Harbor Youth Sailing (CHYS) was incorporated as a separate 501c3 organization. This restructure has allowed CHYS to secure donations and grants that have fueled the growth of the program providing access to the waters of Charlotte Harbor by many more kids. CHYS now

owns eight Optimus Dinghies, eight Club 420s, five Laser Radials, one Flying Scot, two 17' RIBs, one Logic coach boat, nine floating docks and an aluminum access ramp. Donations also fund the CHYS

scholarship program. This summer, CHYS will provide fifteen scholarships (\$3,000) to disadvantaged kids managed by Children's Network of Southwest Florida (foster care and adoption placement NGO for Charlotte and surrounding counties) and the Guardian ad Litem organization. CHYS Summer Camps offer our program to over 50 kids each summer, and many more through our school year programs.

A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) defines the arm's length business relationship between CHYC and CHYS. A small yearly fee secures use of the grounds and classroom space. CHYS assets (17' "rescue RIBs, use of aluminum ramp, floating docks and Hoyer Lifts) are provided to CHYC, at no charge, for special events, including the CHYC Hospice Cup and CanAm Regattas. The CanAm series of 5 events during late fall, winter and early spring draws world class international, Paralympic and able bodied sailors to CHYC. Charlotte County tourism staff has estimated that these events, that would not be possible without the participation of CHYS, bring in excess of \$1.5 million to our local area.

The CHYS mission is to teach and develop young people sailing and seamanship in a safe, fun and structured environment. CHYS sailors will develop and demonstrate respect for others as well as the environment, and always be willing to lend a helping hand to others on and off the water. The goal is to develop skilled and confident young people who will

be a lifelong credit to the community. In a broader sense, we understand that introducing young people to sailing will give them the skills in and knowledge of a lifelong sport that can develop into not only an avocation but into a vocation. I believe exposure to our program, instructors and volunteers will result in an appreciation of our sport and CHYC, our host. Exposure of our kid's parents have resulted in

memberships. I am hopeful that in the future many of our present and past students will become active members of a yacht club, maybe yours.

Seminar modules are presented by Past Commodores and professionals in financial, management, insurance and other areas. This is an intensive program of how to manage and direct your yacht club today and plan for its future.

The major areas covered are:

**Leadership**: Gaining the trust of members, motivating volunteers to be productive and earning the respect of members and employees.

**Club Management:** Hear the 'secrets' of effective yacht club management in the areas of hiring, firing, testing, managing and compensating employees.

**Communication:** External (advertising, news releases, newspaper/magazine articles and social media) and internal (newsletters, e-mails, websites, and member meetings.)

Commodore/Manager Relations: The ability for these two senior positions to share concepts, plans and data is essential in insuring a well-run and successful club.

**Followship:** How committee member and volunteer support of the club's leaders is crucial in accomplishing the goals and objectives of a successful organization.

Meetings and Presentations: The ability for yacht club leaders to properly and efficiently conduct committee, Board and member meetings as well as delivering information and explaining plans and decisions is critical in gaining the support of the club's members.

**Insurance:** Understanding the myriad of insurance necessary to protect your club in many areas you may not have considered is necessary for today's yacht club leaders.

Club Business: Understanding that every club is a business and it's leaders cannot effectively oversee it's management without a basic understanding of goal setting, finances, costing, pricing and asset management.

Recruiting, Retention and Marketing: Recruiting new members, member retention and

membership diversity and interests is the primary way you can insure the continued success of your club.

**Safety:** Canned safety programs are fine for cans but every yacht club is different. We provide the structure and guidelines each club needs to develop and maintain a custom safety program.

**Strategic Planning**: Get the basics of developing a plan for your club that will set priorities, focus energy and resources to insure the long-range future of your club.

During the seminar, attendees will have ample opportunity to ask questions and seek advice from fellow attendees and presenters on issues unique to their clubs.
