The WAVE on Pensacola Bay

Saturday, September 7, 2019 was a beautiful day to conduct a WAVE event. The NYCP Chapter and the PYC Chapter of the FCA worked together to host the WAVE on Pensacola Bay. Gulf Coast Tents again supported the event, which was held at Pensacola Yacht Club, with their large tent, tables and chairs. Volunteers from NSNCCT "A" school who were young officers destined to become Naval Aviators arrived to serve as "Boat Buddies" for the Wounded Veterans. The local Civil Air Patrol Cadets with their leader arrived to provide additional assistance throughout the day. The Color Guard from Corry Station along with a vocalist participated in the Opening Ceremony. In addition to these volunteers from the community and local Navy facilities, members of Navy Yacht Club Pensacola and Pensacola Yacht Club assisted with the registration and sign up of Skippers and assigning Veterans to their boats.

Our guest speaker was Rear Admiral Kyle Cozad, Commanding Officer, CNET, the largest command at Naval Air Station Pensacola. RADM Cozad, himself a veteran who unfortunately broke his back in late 2017, had participated in the 2018 WAVE arriving in his wheelchair to make his presentation. He was so impressed with the WAVE and what it does for our Wounded Warriors he asked if he could return for the 2019 event.

RADM Cozad arrived at the event with his wife Amy and walked to the podium steadied only by his walker. The Opening Ceremony began with the Color Guard presenting the Colors followed by the vocalist CTN2 Shawana Penro singing a beautiful rendition of the National Anthem. The Pledge of Allegiance followed with Welcome messages from PYC Commodore Nicole Ferry and NYCP Commodore Ken Pyle. Event Chair Kathy Champagne introduced RADM Cozad. His primary message to all those who attended the WAVE was, "Don't let anyone tell you what you can't do!". Having been told by all the doctors that attended to him following his injury that he would never walk again, he proved them wrong. He emphasized and demonstrated that YOU are the only person that should make that decision.

Following the Opening Ceremony, all the Wounded Veterans were matched with their Skippers and escorted to their boats by their "Boat Buddies". All the boats, both Sail and Power, departed the marina for a 2-hour sail on Pensacola Bay. Upon returning to the marina, all the event guests were treated to a lunch prepared by a grill team of veterans from the American Legion Post 240, Pensacola. This Post has supported the WAVE every year it has been conducted on Pensacola Bay. In addition, during the lunch period musical entertainment was provided by Jim Andrews, a local musician who donates his time and talent to the event.

There is no doubt that the Wounded American Veterans who attended this event thoroughly enjoyed the event. One such Army Veteran, Jodis Butler, heard about this event in his home state of Oklahoma and decided to drive all the way to Pensacola to attend. He told us all that he would be back next year. Thank you for your service and your sacrifice Jodis.

The WAVE is a "grassroots" FCA program that is only possible with the help of Navy Yacht Club Pensacola, Pensacola Yacht Club, and the generous support of local community members who appreciate the sacrifices made by our Military. As we all know, Freedom is not Free.





We encourage yacht clubs to support their officers and directors in minimizing the financial commitment required to attend by subsidizing all or part of the expense involved in attending. The investment by a yacht club, we believe, will be repaid by better prepared officers and directors managing their club.

Leadership: Gaining the trust of members, motivating volunteers to be productive and earning the respect of members and employees.

Club Management: Hear the 'secrets' of effective yacht club management in the areas of hiring, firing, testing, managing and compensating employees. **Taxes:** Fully understanding the tax laws as they apply to yacht club revenue sourcing in the only way to protect your club's tax status.

Communication: External (advertising, news releases, newspaper/magazine articles and social media) and internal (newsletters, e-mails, websites, and member meetings.)

Commodore/Manager Relations: The ability for these two senior positions to share concepts, plans and data is essential in insuring a well-run and successful club.
