

Vice Commodore –P/C Navy Yacht Club Pensacola, Bob Sutton



I hail from the Northeast learning to sail a sunfish in the summer of my tenth year off the coast of Provincetown. I continued my love of sailing into adulthood, with racing on the St. Johns River

while stationed in Jacksonville, Florida and have continued to love the water, sailing, and owned several boats during the last 51 years.

I'm currently a self-employed flight instructor, logging over 10,000 flight hours. I retired from the US Navy after 22 years of active duty, flying missions in Desert Storm, Operation Iraqi Freedom, Somalia, and Bosnia where I was awarded an air medal. I've held many positions requiring business savvy, including the President of a multimilliondollar waterfront homeowners association in Maine for over 5 years. Also, I have been responsible for the management and budgeting of a Pro Shop on a busy golf course for two years.

Originally from Laurel, Mississippi, I graduated from George S. Gardiner High School in Laurel in 1957 and went to Mississippi State University where I graduated in May 1961. I was a Distinguished Mili-

tary Graduate in the Army ROTC program and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant, Regular Army and immediately reported to active duty with the 101st Airborne Division. During my military career, I served two tours of duty in Vietnam during the Vietnam Conflict with the 101st Airborne Division: attended the US Army Command and General Staff College; was assigned to the United States Military Academy as Assistant Professor of Mathematics; served with the Defense Communications Agency in Washington, DC where I was a Branch Chief; served at SHAPE Headquarters in Mons, Belgium where I was in the Plans and Policy Division on special assignment for General Bernard Rogers, SACEUR. Upon my retirement, I worked as a Technical Specialist for the Strategic Systems Division of GTE in Westboro, Mass. and was subsequently hired by Missile Systems Division, Rockwell International in Atlanta, Georgia to serve as a Lead Analyst in the Operations Analysis Department. I was later promoted and named the Manager of Strategic Planning and Proposal Development.

Upon leaving Rockwell International, I was named the Vice President and General Manager of Mason-Hanger National in Atlanta, GA. CONGRATULATIONS! HAPPY 70th ANNIVERSARY, FORT WALTON YACHT CLUB!!

Seventy (70) years ago, the "Playground Area of Northwest Florida" welcomed the new Fort Walton Yacht Club (FWYC) with its first Commodore, Clifford Meigs, to the magnificent Emerald Coast. There were seventeen men and women in the original group of organizers, and seventy-three "Charter Members" made up of notable civic leaders of the community. Together, this group of far-sighted citizens succeeded in encouraging the growth and development of this delightful seaside area: our Fort Walton Yacht Club was a vital part of its evolution.

The club's charter was signed on 10 September, 1951, thus, we are a relatively young club compared to other groups who participate in boating and regattas around the country. A plaque in the dining room commemorates the deeding of the land for the clubhouse by E.W. Sudduth. The clubhouse, itself, actually opened in January of 1954. The club's purpose was to "stimulate interest in boating and other outdoor recreation throughout Okaloosa county and Northwest Florida": dues were \$6 per year.

During an interview for the Club's 50th Anniversary, a past Commodore, Bart Fleet, observed that "... one of the reasons for the success of the Club is that it always has represented diverse interests, age groups, and backgrounds". Commodore Fleet continued, "It's a real melting pot – from professional people to construction workers, retired enlisted and officers, motor boaters and sailors...The board represents all these different interests. They debate and hash it out. It still works. It's a pure democracy."

Fort Walton Yacht Club's FCA commemorates 9/11 with Sundowner Ceremony P/C Ray Dewrell FCA Vice Commodore

On Friday, 10 September, the Fort Walton Chapter of the Florida Commodores Association performed a Sundowner Ceremony in honor of the 20th Anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center.

The ceremony was MC'd by Past Commodore Bill Bushell, with invocation directed by Four Star Past Commodore Phyllis Seaton. Past Commodore Bobby Dewrell gave the main address and the colors were retrieved by the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard.

P/C Dewrell's address focused on the heroism shown by First Responders in the aftermath of the 9/11 attacks. He asked us to remember 2,996 people from 78 different countries that lost their lives from the misguided acts of 19 cowards.

He asked that we honor the 343 firefighters, 23 New York City Police officers, and 37 Port Authority police officers that lost their lives as a result of the attack. Passwords

We're all in the same boat on this one. Almost every website that is worth using wants you to set up a password. Some you have to wonder "Why do I need a password to look at a recipe?" Other websites keep rejecting every password you try until your have used (so it seems) every letter in the alphabet and a combination of numbers exceeding the result of multiplying your social number by the year you were born with a few special characters added.

Once you come up with a working password you then have to remember it for the next time you log into the website or app. Or do you? There are a few things you can do to make things easier however each of them has drawbacks.

The easiest approach is to develop one password for all. Design your own combination of 12 letters (upper and lowercase), numbers and symbols for all your websites and apps. This will work as long as you can remember it and if no one hacks into one of the websites or apps and steals all the passwords of their users and associates that password with your name that may appear in another site where they have found you.

Another method is to just develop a separate password for every website and app and then keep them on a sheet of paper or in a little book. This works very well until you are not at home and forgot to carry your sheet of paper or little book; or if you have been carrying the information, you lose it; or someone gains access to your home and steals/copies all the information you have recorded.

Finally, you can subscribe to a password

management service. Some password managers are built-in on some search engines such as Google Chrome or in some web security programs such as Norton or McAfee. They will remember all your very complex passwords. Some of these managers will even suggest passwords that are very secure. In this case you only have to remember one master password (see the easiest approach above.) But, what happens if you forget your master password? No sympathy here! You will have to start all over again and reset every password on every website and app on your own. Not much fun when you're on an extended trip in a location with poor internet reception or questionable security.

The bottom line is you can't get away from having at least one password and if someone installs a keystroke reader on your computer (either hardware or software) they can get all your individual passwords or that one master password. You should also know that if you're traveling and plug your tablet or phone into a USB socket, someone could be accessing the information on your device. That's why I always use a USB data blocker when I plug in away from home.

By now you're expecting a recommendation on how to handle your passwords. I already told you - pick one of the three choices above and good luck. The one thing to keep in mind is that you can't get away with short easy to break passwords on websites or apps to give access to your financial and other important data. The chart below will show you how important it is to use complex passwords. Unfortunately, along with the leaps in good and useful technology, great progress has also been made to assist the 'bad' guys. A password that would take four years to crack in 2000 was able to be broken in one month in 2020.

Creating a long password that you can remember is not that difficult if you develop it based on putting together a chain of items easy for you to recall and throw in a few symbols. For example, let's say your initials are JD and your spouses' name is Jane but she has a sister named Sam (just trying to be up with the times here.) Let's also assume that you were married in Chicago on July 4, 1970. You might use the following password:

JD+sam@ORD#14235!

JD - is you

+ - you got married

sam - is your spouses sibling name

@ - you got married in

ORD - is the airport code for Chicago

- the date you were married

14 - if a number in a sequence is odd - double it, hence 7 becomes 14

2 - if a number is even you divide it by 2, hence 4 becomes 2

35 - again the year 70 is even so you divide by 2

! - shows you're making a statement - if your marriage isn't going well use ? instead.


This is just an example. If you make the password say something you can easily remember, it will be something that you'll become familiar with and you'll be able to reconstruct it. Good Luck!


